8 STEPS TO ACCURATELY MEASURE BLOOD PRESSURE (BP)

Have client sit quietly for 5 minutes

Ask client to empty bladder (A full bladder adds 10 mm Hg) Pause conversation (Talking adds 10 mm Hg)

Support client's arm at heart level (An unsupported arm adds 10 mm Hg)

Put BP cuff on client's bare arm (A cuff over clothing adds 5-50 mm Hg)

Make sure client uncrosses legs (Crossed legs add 2-8 mm Hg)

If BP is elevated, take the average of 2 readings 5 minutes apart Discuss BP reading with client and document in the health record
